# State Park Updates

It has been a long one year since the COVID-19 pandemic hit the world. Each of us is trying his best to get through this stressful time. I hope you and your family and friends are in good health. I know I look forward to the time when staff and volunteers can greet visitors, face to face, and interpret our unique cultural resources to visitors throughout the world.

Below is a short list of park updates that have occurred over the last year:

- During the fall months of 2020 until the COVID-19 cases skyrocketed in Southern California, park staff presented interpretive programming outside the museum on weekends.
- In lieu of Battle Day 2020, staff created an excellent 18-minute video on the history of the Battle of San Pasqual, corresponding online resources, and youth educational activities. A special thanks goes to interpretive staff member Madeleine Meyer for her contributions toward this video.
- Additional cultural videos/demonstrations have been placed on the San Pasqual Battlefield State Historic Park website in the last 90 days. Park staff have been posting regularly to the park's new Facebook page. Please "like" it to stay up to date!
- Park trails are currently open, yet the museum and main parking lot are closed. There is no specific, anticipated, date when the museum will reopen.
- The maintenance staff for the historic sector is in the process of clearing excess vegetation along the half-mile hiking trail from the Monument to the Museum grounds.
- The San Pasqual Battlefield Volunteer Association and State Park staff will conduct a monthly Association ZOOM meeting on **March 19.** Board members will receive a ZOOM link from Megan Suster. This meeting will cover a range of topics, including ideas from the board on new avenues for volunteer recruitment.

Charge as foragers.

# Virtual Museum Tour in the Making

An online museum tour is in the making for the San Pasqual Battlefield State Historic Park. Interpretive staff member Maddie Meyers has already completed an introduction and overview video of the museum, which can be viewed at the park's website. Park Aide Gil Garcia has been writing and memorizing scripts for the individual exhibits. Lucy Chalgren, Seasonal Interpreter at San Elijo and Carlsbad State Beaches, has been doing the directing, video taping, editing, etc. All of this is under the supervision of Megan Suster, Historic Interpreter II. There are 18 total exhibits, so it's a lot of work and it is going to take some time to complete. For me, personally, the memorizing of the scripts and being on video has been a little stressful. However, everybody on the project has been so positive and encouraging, that is has also been a pleasure.

In honor of Women's History Month in March, we wanted to share an excerpt from one of these videos.

JESSIE BENTON FRÉMONT and the ANTI-SLAVERY PARTY March is

Jessie Benton Frémont was an American writer and political activist. She wrote many stories that were printed in popular magazines of the

day as well as several books. She was the daughter of Missouri Senator Thomas Hart Benton, who was a strong proponent of western expansion. In 1840 at the age of 16, while she was studying and living at the Georgetown Seminary, she met the explorer John Charles Frémont. The following year, she married

him.

During the next several years, she supported and encouraged John in so many ways. She served as his secretary, editor, and writing partner. And she helped compose the reports of John's adventures, which were being published in books and newspapers. In 1849, Jessie and her daughter Lily journeyed aboard ship in order to come to California and reunite with John there. With income from their gold mines, they settled in San Francisco and Jessie quickly got involved in city politics. Just like her father, Senator Benton, and her husband, John C. Frémont, Jessie was a mighty powerhouse in her own right. She is one of the main reasons why California joined the Union as a free state.

During the Constitutional Convention in Monterey in 1849, she said, "My pretty rooms are the headquarters for the anti-slavery party; our decision is on the side of free labor!" When the Republican Party was founded in 1856 to oppose the expansion of slavery, her husband John was nominated as the party's first presidential candidate. And, of course, Jessie had a hand in that because she was John's political advisor. She could also converse with diplomats in several languages. Although John's run for president was unsuccessful, he had success as a senator in California and later as the Governor of the Arizona Territory. This, I'm sure, was due in part to the influence and support of his wife, Jessie. After John C. Frémont's death in 1890, Jessie moved to Los Angeles where she spent her remaining years.

What a remarkable woman she was! Don't you agree?

Census (Padrón) of Californios, ages 15 to 60 (quince a sesenta años), available for military service in San Diego taken by Alcalde Francisco María Alvarado, September 19, 1845.

This two-page original document is preserved at UCSD Special Collections. The abbreviated second page is mainly the date and signature of Francisco María Alvarado of Old Town and Rancho Santa María de los Peñasquitos.

We know that some of those listed fought at the Battle of San Pasqual. Of course, participants were not all from the local population.

Try to read these names. If you have visited our sister park at Old Town, you will recognize names from some of the adobes there or from some of the many ranchos in San Diego. You should be able to pick out these familiar Californio family names: Machado, Osuna, Silvas, Lopez, Argüello, Alvarado, Orosco, Ybarra, Marron, Moreno, Ruiz, Soto, Serrano, Morrillo, Manriquez, Ortega, Elisalde, Rodriguez, and Aguilar. Some first names like Francisco, Antonio, and María are abbreviated. Once your eyes adjust to the handwriting and you know what to look for, you should be rewarded and feel a bit more connected to these people.

Can you imagine how excited I was to find this document? For researchers, this official document is like finding treasure


